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	Pupils encouraged to wash their hands before a change of activity. All regular contact surfaces cleaned and disinfected on a daily basis. Particular attention paid to water and sanitation facilities, hand rails, lunch and classroom tables, sports equipment, door and window handles, toys, teaching and learning aids, computers, phones, iPads etc. Curriculum Specific Activities , musical instruments, science and D&T equipment disinfected when used Learning Equipment Computers and tablets etc. which are shared should be cleaned prior to use with a disinfectant wipe. Sports/PE equipment Hand held and frequently touched items disinfected before use including: Netballs, rackets, rugby balls, footballs (hand held at points of play), gym equipment, mats, climbing equipment. Staff shared workstations Shared workstations should be cleaned and disinfected by the user prior to use. Including: desk, keyboard, mouse and telephone. Play equipment and toys Shared toys and equipment cleaned and disinfected on a weekly basis Cleaning, disinfection and waste following a suspected case If a symptomatic person has visited the site additional cleaning will be instigated as soon as reasonably possible after the event to help reduce the possibility of spread. All surfaces that the person has come into contact will be cleaned using disposable cloths and a cleaning/disinfectant solution at a dilution of 1000 parts per million available chlorine including: All potentially contaminated high-contact areas such as toilet facilities, door handles, hand rails etc. in the areas they visited/used all surfaces and objects which are visibly contaminated with body fluids Where there are soft surfaces such as sofas and soft furnishings that are visibly contaminated or have been in high contact these will be steam cleaned. The equipment used should be disposable where possible If more stringent measures are required by Public Health England, they will contact the school to provide instructions. response to someone developing symptoms	All staff, children and families are aware that they should not be in school if the feel unwell and should alert someone if they start to feel unwell during the school day. Anyone showing symptoms will be isolated in the intervention room as soon as possible. If this room is not available, they will be in a similar space away from others, avoiding any soft furnishings which are difficult to clean. Parents of children will be contacted immediately. If a member of staff becomes unwell next of kin will be contacted if they are too unwell to do this themselves. They should be collected as soon as possible. The room will be well ventilated. If the person sits toward the back of the room, staff will be able to monitor from the doorway and reassure without using PPE. PPE will be worn if staff need to be closure than 2 metres or need any form of physical contact to care for the person. PPE will be stored in the room to allow immediate access should it be necessary. This will be checked weekly by JM Any tissues used should be placed in a bin, the bin will be emptied when the room is cleaned. Once the person has left the room will not be used until it has been cleaned following the cleaning guidance. Any waste will also be disposed of following this guidance.
