# Norfolk's Local Offer Education, health and care plans Easy read guide for parents

### Who is this guide for?



This guide may be useful if you:

- are a parent
- you have a learning disability
- you have a child who has special educational needs or disabilities.



If you do not have a learning disability, this guide can still help you to understand the support that **children** and **young people** who have **special educational needs** and **disabilities** can get.



In this guide, the **person** who **parents** look after will be called 'a **child**'. They will be called a child no matter what **age** they are.

## What is an Education, Health and Care plan (EHC) plan?



This is a new way of looking at the needs of your child, with a focus on the views and wishes of you and your **child**.

This is called person centred planning.



It will look at **education support**, **health support** and the **social care support** your **child** needs.



You can ask for an **education**, **health and care needs assessment** if your child:

- is under the age of 25
- has special educational needs
- is in school, college or training
- needs more support than their school or college can provide on their own

If your child is aged 16 or over, they can ask for it themselves.



The education, health and care plan will use the information from the education, health and care needs assessment to say what the views and wishes of you and your child are and what support is needed to help your child.

#### How are families involved?



It is important the **education**, **health and care plan** is focused on the views and wishes of you and your child.



There are resources on the **local offer** which may help you put together your views and wishes.



Things you may want to think about

- their **education**
- their health
- your child's future and how they would like to prepare for it
- where they would like to live
- relationships
- control of their money
- how they would like to be part of the community
- how they will become more independent
- do you want to use a personal budget for some of the support in your child's education, health a care plan.



You will be contacted by an **Education**, **Health and Care plan Coordinator** to get your views and wishes.

#### How long will it take?



The **county council** will let you know if they think your child needs an **education**, **health and care needs assessment** within **6 weeks** of you asking for an **assessment**.

If the **county council** do not think your child needs an **education**, **health and care needs assessment** and you disagree you can **appeal** against their **decision**.



The **county council** will let you know if they think your child needs an **education**, **health and care plan** within **16 weeks** of you asking for an **assessment**.

If the **county council** do not think your child needs an **education**, **health and care plan** and you disagree you can **appeal** against their **decision**.



The county council must finish the education, health and care plan within 20 weeks, when they agree your child needs one.



Certain things may make getting an education, health and care plan take longer than 20 weeks.

They include:

 your child missing appointments with people asked to carry out assessments

- your child being outside of Norfolk for more than 4 weeks
- the school or college being closed for more than 4 weeks
- you can ask for a pause in the process because of a personal circumstance.

## How to request an education, health and care needs assessment?



## You can ask for an **education**, **health and care needs assessment** by

- if you are the parent or carer of the child you can call 0344 800 8020 and ask for the SEN Centre of Excellence
- use the online form on the local offer
- you can make the request in writing and post it to Norfolk County Council

# How will the county council decide if they will carry out an assessment?



The **county council** will speak to the people who have supported your child asking them about the support your child needs. This could include:

- your child's school or college
- doctors or therapists, such as a speech and language therapist, if your child sees them
- social workers, if your child uses social services or needs to
- If your child has problems with hearing or sight, specialist teachers who can help advise other teachers

- an educational psychologist, someone who can advise teachers on how to teach your child
- organisations you have asked for
- and most importantly, information that you have given.



When the **county council** has this information they will **decide** if your child's **school** or **college**:

- has a clear idea of your child's needs
- can show that they have tried to support your child to the best of their ability
- can show your child is still not making expected progress, even with the support they currently get.



The **Education**, **Health and Care plan Coordinator** will contact you to explain the **decision** and talk about what happens next.

## Questions you might want to ask



You might want to find out more information about education, health and care plans and education, health and care needs assessments.

Here are some questions you might want to ask the **county council** or your local **information**, **advice and support service**:

- Who can I talk to about education, health and care needs assessments and education health and care plans?
- How can I get an education, health and care needs assessment for my child?
- Who will be involved in my child's **education**, health and care needs assessment?
- What does an education, health and care plan look like and what information is in it?

#### Important words



An **appeal** is what someone does when they want to try and change a decision about their support that they do not agree with.



**Assess / assessment** is a way of working out what kind of support someone needs.



Children are aged between 0 and 16.



**College** is where young people go to learn skills that they might need when they are older.

If someone is aged between 16 and 25 years old, then they can go to a college.



The **county council** is the group of people who look after things in a local area like services to support children and young people who have special educational needs and disabilities.



**Decisions** are choices people make about what happens in their life.

Some people may need support to make decisions. For example, having things explained in a different way.



A person who has disabilities:

- may have problems with their health
- may find it harder to do things than other people.



An education health and care needs assessment will look at what extra support children and young people with special educational needs might need in their life.



An **education**, **health and care plan** says what support a child or young person who has special educational needs must get.



An **educational psychologist** looks at how a child or young person can be better supported to learn. This includes children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities.



**Education support** can help someone to learn things like reading and writing.





A **personal budget** is money set aside for a young person or a parent by their local council.

It can be used to buy some of the support a child or young person gets in their education, health and care plan.

Sometimes a local council will keep this money and use it to buy some support that a young person or their family might need.



**Preparing for the future** is when children and young people think about what they want to do when they are older.



A **review** is a meeting where the county council, a school or a college, and some other people look at the support a child or young person gets and if it is right for them.



**School** is where children and young people go to learn skills that they might need when they are older.

If someone is aged between 2 and 5 years old, they can go to a **nursery school**.

If someone is aged between 5 and 16 years old, they must receive an education.



**Social care support** is the support someone gets to help them do things like washing, cooking and meeting up with friends.



A **social worker** is someone who works with families to help make sure they get the support they need.



A child or young person who has **special educational needs** may:

- find it harder to learn than other people of their age
- face challenges that make it hard to go to school or college
- need different or extra help to learn.



A **speech and language therapist** is someone who helps children and young people who might find it harder to communicate.



A **statement of special educational needs** is the document that used to be given to children and young people with special educational needs in school who needed a lot of support.

It said what support someone needed to help them learn.

This was called a **learning difficulty assessment** for young people in colleges.



**Training** can help someone get the skills they need for things like getting a job, looking after their money, and getting on with their life.

There are lots of types of training that support someone to do these things.



Young people are aged between 16 and 25.
